She is a 5thgreat granddaughter of Nancy Ward (Nanyehi) and a Cherokee Nation citizen. Her songs have been recorded by Alabama ("Angels Among Us"), Conway Twitty, George Jones, Loretta Lynn, Glen Campbell, Emmylou Harris, Helen Reddy, Shirley Bassey, Wanda Jackson, the Cherokee National Youth Choir, and more. As a recording artist, she's had over 20 Billboard chart singles, including "Jones on the Jukebox," "Honky Tonk Saturday Night," and the Top Ten Duet with Moe Bandy, "Let's Get Over Them Together." The "Beckaroo" has performed in over 40 countries and lives in Nashville, TN. She is thrilled that Nanychi-Beloved Woman of the Cherokee is having its Oklahoma premiere in the heart of the Cherokee Nation.

Nick Sweet (director, co-playwright) has been a freelance stage director since 1977. He has directed more than 130 productions for theatres in Oklahoma, Texas, Alaska, and Georgia, including the historical outdoor drama, Trail of Tears, at the Cherokee Heritage Center in 2002. The previous year, he portrayed the stockade doctor and understudied the role of Will Rogers under the direction of NSU grad and TONY nominee Joe Sears. Nick also directed Annie, The Miracle Worker, Lost Highway: The Hank Williams Story, and The Buddy Holly Story, for the Muskogee Little Theatre. He has written several historical plays including In Our Own Words (Oklahoma School for the Deaf Centennial), Pride of the Prairie, and City of Legends, (Bartlesville's City and Statehood Centennials), and Darkness Before Dawn, (Muskogee Civic Center). He resides near Houston, TX.

She moved to the beautiful North Georgia mountains and graduated from Young Harris College with a Bachelor's Degree in Musical Theatre.
